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# YE-BANKING INCENTIVE CONGREGATION 2019 AT GOSHING PS

To facilitate interaction and real time financial transactions between banks and school children, the Royal Monitory Authority (RMA) organised a two-day Youth Ethics (YE) banking incentive camp at Goshing Primary School in Zhemgang on October 30.

YE-banking is an incentive-based school-banking programme, which recognises and rewards schools for their collective efforts put in together by teachers and students during the yearlong academic session in the fields of academics, co-curricular, behavioural ethics and financial values.

During the incentive day, the bank points (merits) earned and accumulated throughout the year by children of various schools get converted to cash incentives that are further deposited into children's YE-banking accounts.

During the two-day programme about Nu 800,000 was credited to the 16 participating schools. Jigme Losel Primary School in Thimphu received the highest amount of about Nu 120,000.

RMA officials said that the camp also provides hands on experience and inclusive opportunities to connect ethics, values and learning to banking practicalities.

The initiative was first preconceived by Tshering Yangchen, a Class VI student of Jigme Losel Primary School during the Global Money Week game challenge in 2017.

"I am privileged and honoured beyond words to Dasho Governor and RMA for recognising my simple idea and formalising it into such big programme that is benefiting children across the country," said Tshering Yangchen.

Besides the financial benefits, the YE-banking camp remains a much-awaited programme for schools and students for various opportunities.

"Our children woke up as early as 3am, excited to attend the camp," said the officiating principal of Lauri principal school. "This is the first time our children got such opportunity to travel out of Lauri."

The principal of Wangsel Institute in Paro, Dechen Tshering, said that despite being physically challenged, the children are grateful for the opportunity to take part in the programme. "It was a great opportunity for our children to make new friends from other schools."

Zhemgang Dzongrab, Kinzang Dorjee, said that it is more likely that Bhutanese children and people in the rural pockets would face critical challenges of keeping pace with the emerging financial technology developments.

"It is of utmost importance and duty of policy makers, teachers and financial institutions to nurture and educate our children on the inevitable financial life skills and equip every child with updated knowledge, skills and experiences of keeping pace with the financial digital transformations," he said.

RMA with support of the Saving Bank Foundation for International Cooperation in Germany have conducted the YE-banking camp for 16 schools so far.

Participants from Sakteng, Goshing, Zangkhar, Umling, Tabadramtoe, Dechenling, Wangduechholing Lower Secondary Schools, Laya and Phobjikha Central Schools, Tshangkha and Arekha Middle Secondary School, Wangsel Institute in Paro, Khaling Muenselling Institute and Y-VIA Gelephu took part in the camp. It was organized by the officials from Public Heath Engineering Division, Department of Public Health, Ministry of Health, Thimphu with financial and technical support from SNV, Thimphu. Rural Sanitation and Hygiene Program (RSAHP) is a program under the Public Health Engineering Division, Department of Public Health, Ministry of health toilet is supposedly the only toilet that is considered to be an improved toilet among those different kinds of toilets being used by the Bhutanese populace. Today, the coverage of Pour Flush toilet in the district stands at 52.77% only. With this inception, we look forward for 100% in Zhemgang in the next couple of years.


### Mason training for improved toilet construction

The Mason Training for improved toilet construction was conducted at Pantang Gewog Center, Phangkhar Gewog from 21st to 25th of October 2019. There were 40 participants, a participant each from 40 Chiwogs of 8 Gewogs in the Dzongkhag. Officials from Public Heath Engineering Division, Department of Public Health, Ministry of Health and SNV Office, Thimphu and Dzongkhag Health Sector, organized and coordinated the training. Mason training is a part of Rural Sanitation and Hygiene Program (RSAHP). This training was provided with an aim of providing knowledge and skills to the participants who are expected to benefit the public in the rural communities in constructing improved toilet, especially pour flush toilet. With such activities in place in the field of Sanitation and Hygiene, the quality of improved sanitation facilities and its coverage is expected to rise at the fullest by the end of the two-year project on Rural Sanitation and Hygiene Program.

# Zhemgang Prepares for Bird Festival



# Birds of Zhemgang (Source: Zhemgang Forest Division)

Distribution: Western Europe, North-west Africa Indian Subcontinent, South-east Asia.

Diet: It feeds on invertebrates including many pest insects, acoms, beech and other seeds, fruits, young birds and eggs, bats and small rodents.

They are the main source of movement and propagation of European Oak & Holm Oak The bird mimics the sound of others birds such as tawny owl.

The bird nests on trees of large shrubs, lays 4-6 eggs and both sexes feeds their young

#### CR CR CR CR VV NT CO

These woodpecker species inhabit subtropical or tropical moist montane forests and high altitude shrublands.

#### These woodpeckers are monotypic species.

The Darjeeling woodpecker species is distributed in India, Nepal, Bhutan, Myanmar, China and Vietnam.

Birds of Bhutan have record of 20 species of woodpeckers of which ZFD have recorded occurrence of seven species.

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- It breeds from West Asia eastwards across South Asia, Afghanistan, Pakistan, India, Nepal
- This species is declining in its western range, but is abundant in much of South Asia, being scen at almost any wetland habitat in its range
- Breeding season: March-August
- Feeds on insects, snails and other invertebrates, mostly picked from ground. Also feeds on grains.
- The birds is usually seen in pairs or small groups, not far from water.
- The bird is observed in Buli wetland under Zhemgang Dzongkhag.

Features: The bird has white throat, orange flanks, blue tail and red-start like stances. Male has blue upperparts and breast sides. Female has olive brown upperparts and breast sides.

Habitat type: Forest understorey and dense bushes in the forest and clearings.

Diet: Feed on invertebrates, fruits and seeds.

Distribution in Zhemgang Nimshong, Zhemgang and Duenmang,

Conservation Status: Least Concern

Features: The bird have grey upperparts and blackish remiges, underparts are whitish tinged rufous, especially on the flanks and crissum. They have yellow bill with pale blue base.

Habitat type: Open woodland and cultivated areas.

Diet: The bird is omnivorous, feeding on fruits, nectar and insects.

Distribution in Zhemgang: Tingtibi and Panbang

Conservation Status: LC

#### 7. White-throated Kingfisher Halcyon smyrnensis

How Many Species of Kingfishers are found in Bhutan?


Kingfishers belong to the family Alcedines. There are 120 species of Kingfisher around the globe. 42 species are threatened as per the IUCN. http://datazone.birdlife.org.

In Bhutan, there are Nine species of Kingfishers. Blyth's Kingfisher *Alcedo hercules* is a near threatened species.

Zhemgang Forest Division have recorded three species of Kingfisher i e Common Kingfisher, White throated Kingfisher, and Crested Kingfisher .

White-throated kingfisher is a common visitor at Bermo Botanical Garden.

Common Name: Green-bellied Malkoha Scientific Name: Phaenicophaeus tristis Family: Cuculidae


Features: The bird are waxy bluish black with long graduated tail with white tips to the tail feathers.

Habitat type: Dry scrub, dense thickets and thin forests

Diet: Insects, caterpillar, lizards

Distribution in Zhemgang: Dakpai, Buli, Tali, Zhemgang and Panbang area

**Conservation Status:** Least Concern


14. Chestnut-bellied nuthatch (Sitta cinnamoventris)



Common name: Silver-eared Mesia Scientific name: Leiothrix argentauris Family: Leiotrichidae

These are brightly colored birds with silver face patches, yellow throat and chest, olive green belly, grey upper wings with a red patch then the yellow again on the ends of the wings and a black tail. The males have red-orange rumps while the females have yellow rumps and this is the main way to identify of male and female birds.

This bird is best seen at Duenmai



The Himalayan Cutia is usually found in multiple numbers foraging among foliage, mossy branches and trunks of broadleaved trees. We have recorded the bird from Talila, Gonpong, Gonglathang and Malaya areas under the jurisdiction of Zhemgang Forest Division.

Scientific name: Vanellus duvaucelli Common name: River Lapwing Family: Charadriidae IUCN status: Near Threatened

This species inhabit sandbanks and shingle banks of river. It is one of the two Lapwing species recorded within the jurisdiction of Zhemgang Forest Division and can be observed along Mandgdechhu and Chamkharchhu river basin, usually singly or in pairs.

#### Common name – White-bellied Hero Scientific name – Ardea insignis

Conservation status: IUCN – Critically Endangered FNCA 1995 – Schedule I

Current population: Globally – 60 individuals (WBHWG, 2015) Bhutan – 25 individuals (RSPN, 2019)

#### Distribution:

Global distribution – Bhutan, China, India and Myanmar Bhutan – Punatsangchhu Basins, Mangdechhu Basins, Chamkha rchhu Basisn, Kurichhu Basins and Drangmachhu Basins

Current threats: Globally – habitat loss Bhutan – habitat loss, low reproductive capacity

Significance – White-bellied heron is first sighted in Bhutan 1976 at Mochu by His Majesty the fourth king Jigme Singye Wangchuck (RSPN, 2011). Thus we dedicate conservation success of this heron species in Bhutan to our beloved Great Fourth. Mangdechhu is home for second largest population WBH in the country. The Bhutan Bird Festival is held in Tingtibi, Zhemgang within the habitat

range of this heron species.

Common Name: Rufous-necked Hornbill

Scientific Name: Aceros nipalensis

A Rufous-necked hornbill is a species of hornbill found distributed in northeastern India, western Thailand, north-western Vietnam and Bhutan. It is among the largest Bucerotine hornbill with a length of about 117cm. The male and female bird can be identified by the colour of the under part; neck and heads are rich rufous in male and black in female. The bird is found nesting in hilly forest, mainly broadleaved forest at an altitude of 150-2200m

The bird is found nesting in hilly forest, mainly broadleaved forest at an altitude of 150-2200m and had also been recorded in woodlands. The nesting period starts from March-June and prefers tall and broad girth trees. The bird depends on fruiting trees. Due to hunting and significance loss of habitat, the birds is locally extinct in Nepal. The bird is listed in CITES Appendices I & II and Vulnerable in IUCN Red Lists of Threatened Species.
